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

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PARO Centre for Women Complete Mental Health **Research Study**

PARO recently completed research on the mental health of women entrepreneurs and theh results are on the PARO website. It was also presented at their International Women's Day event in North Bay as well as reported in national publications such as the Toronto Star.

" People are really interested as they realize the impact of the pandemic was huge in many ways and one of them was the impact on mental health for women. That was primarily because of the extra load they had to play with family. Also the kinds of businesses and work they do primarily are in the service industry which meant they had to close up quite often. There was also an increase in domestic violence because of the extra stress and being together more than usual. All together this has huge impact. I do think governments are aware of this." said Rosalind Lockyer, Executive Director PARO

PARO works in many rural communities where there aren't a lot of services available in mental health and is one of the challenges in supporting women entrepreneurs in smaller areas. PARO does not supply support for mental health but are interested and have partners working in these

" My personal impression of the results of the research was that many of the things found have always been there and memthat takes time. You don't just start up a business and make a living from it immediately- you have to build up customers, connections, knowledge and experience. Some businesses did better but for many women they weren't in those type of busi-

bers agree. What has happened now is it has escalated with other factors that are weighing heavily. Everyone needed a break after COVID but we didn't get a break, but keep on working and living with the fallout of the pandemic. Right now as well all the rising costs is another stress," said Ros. "When you are trying to build up your business again after the pandemic

nesses. Some smaller businesses received little support. We are still transitioning and need an increase in services to support people."

PARO is going well!

"We have a vibrant team and are working just as much as we ever have in Northern

Ontario as well as all over Ontario and in seven provinces. We don't do the same things in all of the provinces. Across Ontario we provide various kinds of training to meet the needs of women they say they have as we constantly survey them."

PARO has different kinds of funding available- One is with our peer circle networkthey now call them prosper circles and are setting them up across the country. These circles are essential in providing sustainable livelihood. They look at the circles from a wholistic approach- at building a good life for you. You need to have energy and know what you want out of life, have good connections for support including both family friends and business as you live life. You need physical support like a laptop, phone, internet and food, exercise etc. On top of that you need training which always changing. That keeps you alive and happy. You also need money.

They say with peer support you are 7 times more likely to succeed and sustain. PARO have over 250 Peer Support groups now with 4 to 7 people in each circle and have been doing this for 30 years now. PARO has a staff of 41, some being contractors who work some days for PARO.

PARO has many online supports available which worked well during Covid and now many women find it a preferred way in terms of time.

- "We also work with businesses that are doing well and want to scale up to a high level and say sell their products in another country. We have had success in this area. We take groups of women on trade missions with the proper supports while they are there and they see other women being successful. There are big corporations there to connect with as well." said Ros.
- "We took 30 women to Denver in March where they were very excited to introduce the women to other businesses to make



connections. We have a funding program for taking women on trade missions. Go for the Green is a trade mission that is smaller to start out with and a good one in which to begin."

- "We also can do loans up to \$50,000 with our partners. We are also working hard to get women involved with investors. These things take time and we want to move the needle on that as it is small right now."
- "I still do have a passion for the job, I learn every day. Women have so many skills and are interested in what they are doing and working with others. That keeps me inspired." said Rosalind Lockyer, Executive Director PARO.

Following an extensive candidate search and a rigorous selection process, City Council today announced the hiring of John Collin as the new City Manager, effective June 17.

Collin brings 40 years of leadership and management experience to the role. His path began with a 35-year career in the Canadian Armed Forces, culminating at the rank of Major-General. His military service saw him engaged in many domestic and overseas operations, as well as important positions teaching others and developing strategic and operational plans.

Collin was also the City Manager in Saint John, New Brunswick for four years where he and his leadership team addressed severe financial concerns, saw renewed growth and vibrancy, and developed many initiatives and plans to address concerns within modern cities. Before that he worked in a leadership role at Bruce Power in Kincardine, Ontario, and was responsible for emergency preparedness and response during heightened security concerns and post the Fukushima disaster.

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

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Ontario Funding Innovative Microplastic Capture Project in Thunder Bay

Province reinvesting environmental penalties paid by polluters to support local environmental project

The Ontario government is providing nearly \$45,000 to EcoSuperior to lead a prevention-focused project designed to keep plastic pollution out of local waterways and Lake Superior.

"The Ontario Community Environment Fund taps into the creativity, dedication and experience of local organizations who know where and how best to tackle the impacts of pollution in their communities," said Andrea Khanjin, Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks. "The innovative microplastics capture



work, led by EcoSuperior will help protect our precious water resources for future generations."

In partnership with the City of Thunder Bay, EcoSuperior will install LittaTraps, a cutting-edge catch basin filter, in storm drains across the city. The devices are designed to capture small fragments of plastics known as microplastics, preventing them from entering water ecosystems, and harming aquatic life, and the many species of birds and wildlife that depend on them. By strategically placing these traps near city parks, waterfront areas and parking lots, the project aims to identify and address plastic pollution hotspots.

"Our mission is 'Building a Healthy Future for People and the Planet'. Through the support of the Government of Ontario, we are able to continue to reduce litter in our waterways and educate our community on the importance of waste reduction," said Erin Moir, Co-Executive Director, EcoSuperior Environmental Programs. "Through this project we will capture litter debris and microplastics before they reach our waterways, making a tangible difference in preserving the health of Lake Superior."

EcoSuperior will compile a comprehensive report for the City of Thunder Bay to help inform local solutions to plastic waste, which could include trash cleanups, better waste management infrastructure, increased garbage collection in key areas, and improved signage. EcoSuperior will also extend the impact of the collected data



by connecting with the International Trash Trapping Network to contribute to the global fight against plastic pollution.







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IMPRESSIVE SHIPPING RESULTS FOR PORT OF THUNDER BAY

The latest shipping statistics for April in the Port of Thunder Bay show an increase in cargo volume, with 36% more tonnage compared to the corresponding month in the previous year.


After a downturn in grain shipping two seasons ago due to a poor harvest, the recovery in grain volumes that began last year continues this spring. The port has surpassed average export levels, registering an 11% increase in grain shipments compared to the fiveyear average. Year-to-date grain exports have also seen a substantial rise of 25% compared to the same period last season.

The exceptional potash season last year has also carried over, with potash shipments in April already 4.4 times higher than the previous season. The Port of Thunder Bay has established

itself as a reliable hub for potash exports, with a promising outlook for sustained high export levels in the ongoing season.

At Keefer Terminal, the port's stevedoring partner Logistec handled imports of phosphate fertilizer and steel rail, which are stored on-site for future transshipment to Western Canada.

A notable highlight this month is the increased vessel traffic in port compared to the previous season. Fourteen additional ships called upon our port, with nine of them being foreign vessels, commonly referred to as "salties."

I asked Michelle Salo, incoming President some questions at the media event

How did your journey begin and end up until now?

"I started my work career at the mill in Dryden,Ontario working as an office temporary in the accounting department after attending Confederation College. I went forward and got my accounting designation as I was working and continued to progress in my career moving up to a VP of Finance in Raleigh, North Carolina."

- "We really missed the North and Thunder Bay so moved back and worked at the mill here. Through a series of changes I ended up at the college which is someplace I really wanted to be when we were looking at moving back. This was kind of my dream job, being back at the college."
- "I think it is amazing to show students with my journey here at the college, what you are capable of doing. It is not just where you start but where you end your career. My career started taking business administration here at the college and then moved to concentrate on accounting through my designation."

You have a focus on students?


- "I want students here at Confederation College to feel a sense of comfort where they can come and get a good education, but also feel they are supported by all the faculty, staff and that we have everything they need."
- "We concentrate on making sure our International students are comfortable here including having resident options for them. There are International students at Confederation College in Fort Frances, Kenora and Dryden as well. In the past year we are close at a 50/50 with our ratio of international students which is our new allotment. There are some reputation challenges with the recent announcement by the Canada government so we are trying to build that reputation back up."

How did the selection process go?

- "The selection was a very comprehensive process that took the executive committee about six months from start to finish. We received over 30 applications from across Canada, doing a first round of interviews of six then to a short list. This is one of the first times hiring someone from within but also the first alumnus of the college."
- "Michelle was no doubt the number one candidate and she certainly earned the job. Our committee spent hundreds of hours to go through this process as it is a very significant job."



Whitewater Golf Club 20th Season!

If you were a golfer, there was a lot of excitement in the early 2000's when Bruno's Contracting decided to create a new golf course in Thunder Bay- Whitewater Golf

I fully remember being taken through the process of the building of this beautiful course when Bruno's Contracting owner, Silvio, would come by, pick up my father and myself and take us out for a tour of how the construction of the course was progressing. My father was an avid golfer from the age of 12 in Southern Ontario, and also was very instrumental in creating the Manitouwadge Golf Club. He really enjoyed seeing the course construction come along.

Silvio must have made hundreds of trips like this with potential members but always would say when I asked "This is my job."

It was in the fall of 2003 that my father and I got to play one hole at the Whitewater Golf Club before it was open and that was an experience I will always remember.

Recently Whitewater held a special dinner for it's members, including some that have been at the club every year since its very beginning for 20 years. It was fun to see some of the original members at this dinner which I think number almost 50.


The course has seen many good achievements, including having five very successful PGA Tour Canada events, and also many, many rounds of play from the people of Northwestern Ontario and beyond.

It is also very interesting to see the growth of the residential subdivision adjacent to the course called King George's Park. In 2005 when we completed building a home in the

subdivision there were five houses and four townhomes at that time. Today there are over 150 townhomes and individual houses which has certainly created your own little community. This summer, I've been told, the next street in King George's Park Drive will be under construction with new homes and paved this season to help complete this impressive community. There are building lots available if you want to experience living in a rural community.

The golf course itself is really a great asset for the community, designed by well-known Canadian architect Thomas McBroom. It is a championship course that you can definitely feel comfortable playing many, many times and not feel like it is boring. At almost 7300 yards it really is a championship golf course. I especially like the holes adjacent to the Kam River which are very scenic and basically right in nature. I think the course, when you get out and play, gives you the feel that Thunder Bay can offer the same amenities as much larger urban settings.

The team at Whitewater continue to advance the course with new golf carts this year as




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well as lawn equipment to prepare the course each day. I'm thinking, the future of Whitewater is good with new young man-
